PRE- AND POST-VISIT ACTIVITIES

Make the most of your visit to the Weatherspoon Art Museum with these pre-and post-visit activities.

Visual Literacy is about recognizing, understanding and analyzing ideas and information through images--rather than text--and it is at the heart of WAM's educational philosophy. When you come to the museum with your class or group, be prepared to: observe, ask questions, and share your thoughts and opinions.

PRE-VISIT: Learning to Look

Practicing observation and discussion skills.

Keep in mind not all works may be on view when you visit.

- Ask students these questions as you look closely at each artwork. Remember that all responses are valid and that students will likely see and interpret a single work quite differently:
 - What is going on in this work of art?
 - What do you see that makes you say that?
 - What more can you find?

PRE-VISIT: Think, Pair, Share

- Ask students to select their favorite artwork from the images suggested and write or choose 5-10 adjectives that describe it. (See Artworks Adjective List below.) Just for fun, you may want to try doing this activity from memory.
- Instruct students to exchange word lists with a partner. Can the partner identify the artwork described?
- Look at the artworks again, and invite students to share, and add to, their descriptive word lists as a group.

PRE-VISIT: What Do You Expect?

- Ask students what they expect to see and do when they visit the museum.
- As a group, construct a list of questions you would like to investigate during your visit to the museum.

POST-VISIT: What Will You Remember?

- Invite students to reflect on and write about a memorable aspect of their visit. For some it may be a specific artwork. For others it may be visiting a university campus; the way an art exhibition is installed; an architectural feature of the museum; taking a "selfie" with their favorite artwork; or an activity they experienced with a museum docent.
- In teams ask students to interview each other about their most memorable experience, gathering details for a short news story to be shared with the class.
